

Dear Friends,

I would like to thank the voters for electing me to represent you on the Eastampton Township Council. I would also like to thank my fellow Council members for selecting me to serve as Mayor for 2022. It is an honor to serve my community, and a privilege to have the opportunity to build a better home for my family. I am also very grateful to my wife Michelle and our children for their continued support.

I look forward to the coming year, which I believe will continue to bring further improvements to our Township. We have already secured state and county grant funds that have allowed us to make improvements to our parks, roads, and walking paths, and we will continue to look for new opportunities to enhance the quality of life in Eastampton.

Eastampton has made progress in redeveloping our town center while working on other goals of our community's Master Plan, which calls for smart growth and a balance between preservation and development. We plan to further extend this progress by enhancing our efforts to attract new commercial development to our Township. In our efforts to achieve progress we will not lose sight of maintaining the character of Eastampton that our residents enjoy.

Our municipal departments will continue to maximize the value of your tax dollars, and we will continue to invest in those capital projects that are necessary to maintain the safety and curbside appeal of our Township. One of the main areas of vocal resident concern is the quality of our roads. Township Council recently took measures to ensure the Township's roads were a top priority, with a \$2.2 million dollar road improvements bond.

We may be geographically small in size, but whether you are a visitor, seeking a location for your business, or a potential future resident, Eastampton is certain to provide countless opportunities for you to enjoy your time here with our parks. Thanks to funding received from Municipal Aid Development Grants we have new playground equipment and Sports Courts at Buttonwood and Cliver Parks, and a

new Gazebo at Cliver Park for enjoying a family picnic. Grant funding will also be used for the installation of a new pavilion at Veterans Park this year.

There are plenty of walking and biking paths for exercise, or to simply enjoy time outdoors. Eastampton Township is also home to Burlington County's 280 acre Historic Smithville Park, which includes the Smithville Mansion, a section of the Rancocas Creek, and Smithville Lake, with a 600-foot floating walkway.

Eastampton Township always strives to serve our residents in the best manner possible, and our website is just one of the ways we accomplish that. It has been developed for the convenience of our residents and visitors, and offers a wealth of information about our Township. Here you'll find important contact, department, calendar, and other information you may need. During the global pandemic Township Council recognized the need to offer additional online services. In 2022 administrative staff will work with GovPilot to launch several more user-friendly online services, including Dog Registration.

Deputy Mayor Rob Apgar

Rob has been a resident of Eastampton since 2010. He lives with his wife Ally, a public school teacher, and their two children in Eastampton Farms. His daughters attend the Eastampton Community School.

Currently employed by the State of New Jersey, Rob is a grants administrator with experience in the non-profit and public sectors. Rob has also taught courses in sustainable development and environmental history at Rowan College at Burlington County (formerly BCC) and The College of New Jersey.

Rob earned a Bachelor of Arts in history from The College of New Jersey in 2005, graduating with highest honors, and a Master of Environmental Studies degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 2010, with a concentration in environmental policy.

While on Council, Rob has served as a member of the Environmental Advisory Committee, a member of the Land Use Planning Board, Council's liaison to the Eastampton Community School, and as Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

Council Member Eddie Besko

Eddie has been a resident of Eastampton since 1989, completing his education here from preschool through eighth grade. Upon graduating from Rancocas Valley Regional High School in 2004, Eddie attained a partial scholarship and graduated from DeVry University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration that concentrated on the newly offered Business Information Systems program.

Eddie has been and continues to be active in Scouting, achieving the prestigious Eagle Scout rank, leading the beautification of Veterans Memorial Park for his Eagle Scout Project and continuing to serve as a troop committee member. He also played in the Eastampton Youth Soccer Association founded by his father in 1999, became a soccer referee in 2001 and continues to referee.

Eddie joined the Eastampton Recreation Committee in 2017 and became Co-Chair in 2018. In 2019, he began serving on the Veterans & Military Affairs Committee.

Eddie was elected as Councilman in November 2018, serving his first year on Township Council in 2019 and continues to focus on serving the residents of Eastampton and assist in supporting community efforts that enhance our future goals.

Council Member Dominic F. Santillo

Dominic F. Santillo has been a resident of Eastampton Township since 2013, residing in Eastampton Meadows (Farms). Since moving to town he has been a member of the Eastampton Community School Superintendent search committee (2016) and was appointed as a member of the Eastampton Land Use Planning Board in January 2018. Dominic is also active in the community as a volunteer coach for Sacred Heart CYO Baseball & Softball. Mr. Santillo has been a coach for 7+ years of baseball & tee-ball, and is also a member of the Board of Directors of Sacred Heart serving as VP Marketing. Dominic is also a member of the Sons of the American Legion, Mount Holly Post #11.

Dominic and his wife of fifteen years, Elizabeth, met at The College of New Jersey. They previously lived together in Bordentown and Willingboro before settling down in Eastampton with their three children: Dominic Jr (13), Kaitlyn (11) and David (8). All three children attend Eastampton Community School and are active

participants in Sacred Heart CYO Baseball & Softball and RV Soccer. Beth is a school teacher in the Bordentown Regional School District.

Dominic is employed by Christiana Care Health System in Newark, DE as an Information Services Team Leader. He has worked at Christiana Care for over 8 years and currently oversees the Enterprise Medical Record Core and Incident Management Services team. He has previously served as application analyst and systems engineer working with the EMR team. Previous healthcare IT experience includes time served at Kennedy Health System in Cherry Hill and as a vendor consultant traveling across the US implementing emergency department software.

Dominic was admitted to The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) and participated in Student Government and other activities while attaining a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with a Specialization in Information Systems Management. After graduation, he spent time in the restaurant industry as a server, bartender and banquet manager until finding a position to leverage his IT skills.

Raised in Garfield, NJ (Bergen County) where he attended public school for grades K-12, in his junior year of high school Dominic was selected to attend the American Legion Jersey Boys State ("ALJBS") program. Held at Rider University the weeklong, hands-on leadership seminar on civics and government, Dominic served as "mayor" of his Boys State city. He returned to be a member of the all-volunteer staff the following year and has served 23 consecutive years. He now serves as First Assistant Director and Dean of the Program where he oversees every facet of the program from invitations of keynote speakers, scheduling, and staffing. In addition, he also was selected as a Trustee of the New Jersey Boys State Foundation - the fundraising organization associated with the program. In June of 2008, Dominic was elected as Chairman and has since served in that capacity. As Chairman of the 24-member board, Mr. Santillo oversees the annual budget, meeting planning and coordinates fundraising efforts from a Parent Mailing, online campaigns via Paypal, annual 5K's and other dine & donate events. Dominic also maintains websites for both ALJBS and the NJ Boys State Foundation.

Dominic was elected to Township Council in November, 2018. Dominic represents the Township Council on the Land Use Planning Board. Dominic served as Deputy Mayor in 2020 and Mayor in 2021.

Council Member Jay Springer

Jay has been a resident of Eastampton Township since 1991. For 10 years he lived in Eastampton Mews and served as President on the board of the Eastampton Mews Homeowners Association. In 2001 he and his family moved to the Lakeview section of town. Prior to his election to Eastampton Township Council, he was active on the Township's Environmental Commission and was Vice Chair of the Township's Land Use Planning Board.

Jay and Kim, his wife of 32 years, have two children, Joshua and Jenna, who both attended the Eastampton Community School. Jay has been very active in the community for many years. He coached youth baseball and softball and currently volunteers much of his time in support of the performing arts programs at Rancocas Valley Regional High School. He also serves as a Chief Steward with the Communications Workers of America Local 1036 and is a New Jersey AFL-CIO endorsed labor candidate.

For the past 33 years Jay was employed as an environmental professional at the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and has a diverse background in several clean water programs working on initiatives such as watershed restoration, sustainability and controlling water pollution. He also represents the State of New Jersey on the federal Delaware Estuary Program, working with partners from around the region in the corporate, public and non-profit sectors. In 2021 Jay became the Business Administrator for Lumberton Township, in Burlington County.

He attended Rowan University, where he met his wife Kim and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology in 1988. In 2017, he earned a Certified Public Manager (CPM) from the Rutgers University School of Public Affairs and Administration. He has also been an Instructor at Rutgers University teaching Continuing Professional Education courses on Wetlands, Stormwater and Floodplain Management and has been a guest speaker on environmental issues at classes and seminars at the University of Pennsylvania, Yale University, Montclair State University, Stevens Institute of Technology and at several environmental, professional an governmental organization events.

Jay was first elected to Township Council in 2008 and served as Deputy Mayor in 2009 and 2019; and as Mayor in 2010 and 2017. He currently represents Township Council on the Environmental Advisory Committee and the Land Use Planning Board and has previously represented the Township Council on the Economic Development Advisory Committee.

RESIDENT CORNER



Residents Are Reminded That All Dogs over 7
Months of Age Are Required to be Licensed Each
Year. We began our new online dog licensing on
January 1, 2022, please go to Online Services |
Eastampton New Jersey
The cost for the months of
January and February is \$10.00 for a
neutered/spayed dog and \$13.00 for a nonneutered/spayed dog.

A <u>\$10.00</u> additional fee will be assessed for each dog beginning on <u>March 1</u> as per Ordinance 2021-5. In addition to online payments you can also drop off or mail your dog license application and payment along with a self-addressed stamped envelope to receive your license by mail.

Please note that the **rabies vaccination must be valid through November 1, 2022 by NJ State Law** to obtain the dog license. Animal Control personnel are permitted to inspect current licenses for all dogs residing within the Township. Licensing information may be obtained by calling (609) 267-5723 ext. 200.

Christmas Tree Collection. The Department of Public Works collects Christmas trees beginning on January 11, 2022. Trees should be placed curbside for collection, and all lights, decorations and tree stand must be removed. Live, artificial, or trees which are chemically treated or "flocked" will be collected on an as needed basis. Bulk Pickup

We need everyone's cooperation to help keep Eastampton neat and tidy. Anything is to be placed out only on the night before your scheduled pickup day. Please note that as per Ordinance 2019-17 no house clean outs will be accepted for bulk pick-up by the Public Works department. Please note bulk pickup has been suspended due to limited staffing as a result of the surge in COVID-19 cases. The regular schedule will resume on February 4, 2022.

Tips for Residents During Winter Weather Advisories and Storms:

- Be aware of parking regulations and once snow has begun, remove all vehicles from roadways to enable plow trucks to clear the roads. In general, it is helpful to park vehicles in garages and driveways wherever possible and not on the street during a storm to improve street snow clearing.
- Remove accumulated snow from abutting sidewalks to assist neighbor and school student safety. When clearing snow, be mindful not to shovel snow into roadways or adjoining properties.
- Shoveling out neighborhood fire hydrants is encouraged to allow for quick location and access in event of an emergency. Residents should be aware of fire hydrant locations and street address signs that could become inaccessible due to snow accumulation.
- Unless officially authorized, residents should never assume that frozen ponds or lakes are suitable for skating or other recreational activities

Eastampton Township Leaf Collection.

Public Works will begin collecting leaves in October through January. The schedule may be modified at any time due to personnel, equipment and inclement weather.

Residents can rake them to the curb for collection. Leaves should be placed in the grass strip

between the curb and sidewalk, not in the street. Leaves should not be placed near fire hydrants, sign posts, portable basketball hoops, or telephone poles. Leaves must be free of all trash, sticks, branches, vines, rocks, dirt, and debris. **Mixed material will not be collected.** Additional information including your areas scheduled collection week can be found below, or by contacting the Public Works Department at (609) 267-5723, ext. 210

Please adhere to the schedule of your area for leaf collection. Leaves are to be placed out only the week before your scheduled pickup day.

It is especially important that leaves are not placed at the curb many days before scheduled pickup days, as rain makes the leaves wet and difficult to collect, and presents a safety hazard to Eastampton staff and other residents.
