HOLIDAY CORNER

As we approach the **July 4th** holiday weekend, we wanted to send out a message to our residents in regards to fireworks. We encourage the residents of Eastampton Township to enjoy the holiday weekend in a responsible way while celebrating and spending time together. We understand that some will take it upon themselves to engage in setting off fireworks at their own residences.

We would like to remind everyone of **Township Ordinance 343-1**. *It shall be unlawful for any person to make, continue or cause to be made or continued any loud, unnecessary or unusual noise or any noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of others within the limits of the Township.* Respectfully, **Title 21** (Explosives and Fireworks) of **New Jersey State Code**, specifically **21:2-6 Dangerous fireworks prohibited**, states: *it shall be unlawful to manufacture, sell, transport, or use dangerous fireworks within the state. "Dangerous fireworks" include:*

- Toy torpedoes containing more than 5 grains of an explosive composition.
- Paper caps containing more than .35 grain of explosive composition.
- Firecrackers or salutes exceeding 5 inches in length or 3/4 inch in diameter.
- Cannons, canes, pistols or other devices designed for use otherwise than with paper caps.
- Any fireworks containing a compound or mixture of yellow or white phosphorous or mercury.
- Any fireworks that contain a detonator or blasting cap.
- Fireworks compositions that ignite spontaneously or undergo marked decomposition when subjected for 48 consecutive hours to a temperature of 167 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Fireworks that can be exploded en masse by a blasting cap placed in one of the units or by impact of a rifle bullet or otherwise.
- Fireworks, such as fuses, containing a match tip, or head, or similar igniting point or surface, unless each individual tip, head or igniting point or surface is thoroughly covered and securely protected from accidental contact or friction with any other surface.
- Fireworks containing an ammonium salt and a chlorate.

We ask that everyone please be considerate of your fellow neighbors and their animals. Many residents have young children and animals that may become anxious and frightened at the sound of fireworks. Please also remember that fireworks are dangerous explosive devices that can lead to severe injuries and even lead to death. On behalf of the Township of Eastampton we wish you a happy and healthy **4th of July**. Please enjoy it responsibly!

There are two vacancies on the Land Use Planning Board, with the members to be appointed by Township Council. To apply please complete a Citizen Leadership Form at the following link:

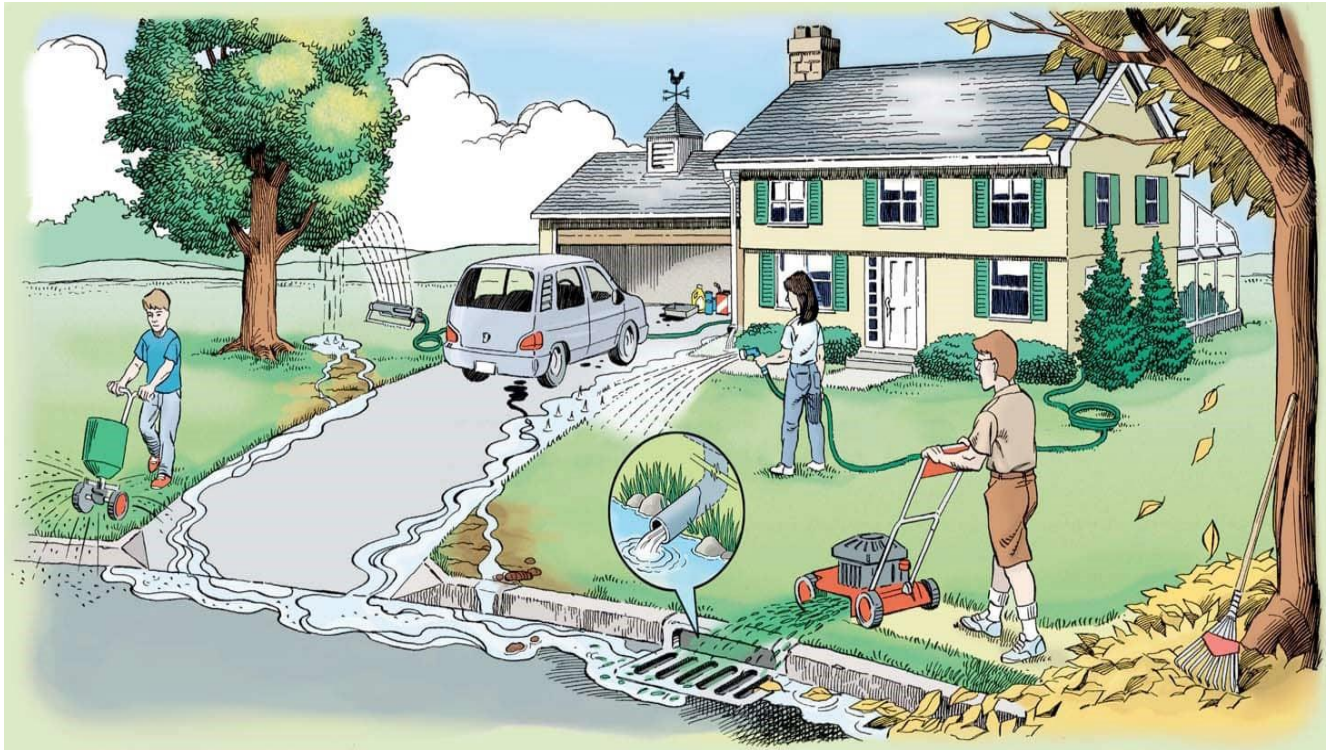

RECYCLING REJECTIONS

Eastampton Township has been notified by Burlington County Recycling regarding rejection of non-acceptable items in residents' recycling collection. Some common rejections are: Styrofoam, loose trash and trash in bags, recycling is bagged in plastic bags, yard waste, large piles of boxes, construction materials, metal poles, wood, plastic wrap, pizza boxes and TV's. Please note the residents' address and reason for rejection are submitted to Eastampton Township. **Burlington County reserves the right to refuse to collect from addresses that continue to place rejected materials in their recycling.**

STREET SWEEPING

The Township would like to thank everyone that moved vehicles and portable basketball hoops in preparation of the street sweeping the week of June 19th. We collected **17.25 tons of debris** from the Township roadways!



PREVENT STORMWATER POLLUTION

We need your help to reduce the following major pollutants in stormwater that are reaching our streams and creeks. Check out these tips to see what you can do to help prevent stormwater runoff and water pollution.

Oil and engine fluids - Oil and engine fluids left on roads and driveways are washed away during rain and flood events. These chemicals are highly toxic to aquatic plants and animals. It only takes four quarts, or about one oil change, of used motor oil to foul 1 million gallons of water. Fix leaks and absorb automotive fluid spills with kitty litter before sweeping the litter into the trash bin.

Soap and residues from car washing - When you wash your car in a driveway, dirty water and soap ends up in storm drains, bringing pollutants with it. Soap and vehicle residues can severely damage fragile aquatic ecosystems. Wash your car on the lawn or at a commercial car wash. If you don't have a grassy spot or a wash bay connected to sanitary sewer, the next best way to protect waterways is to redirect all that dirty water away from the storm drain where it can be absorbed into the ground. Choose biodegradable soaps by looking for the [EPA Safer Choice](#) label.

Litter - During storms, rainwater carries litter from our streets and sidewalks into storm drains, which lead directly to the nearest stream. Litter can be toxic as it breaks down and can suffocate turtles, birds and other aquatic life. Place trash and recyclables in the appropriate bins.

Pet waste - Pet waste can contain harmful bacteria or parasites that can last up to 10 years. If these organisms get into our stormwater, they can spread disease to wildlife, other pets, and even people. Scoop the poop in your yard and on walks with your pet.

Household hazardous wastes and products - Household hazardous wastes include leftover cooking oil, paint, batteries, drain openers, and much more. If these products are improperly used, stored, or disposed of, they can be released into stormwater and cause great environmental harm. Properly dispose of household hazardous waste on special collections at Gloucester County Improvement Authority.

Fertilizers - As rainwater flows across land, it picks up fertilizers and carries them to storm drains, which lead to the nearest stream. Nutrients from fertilizers feed algae blooms, which can make our lakes and ponds ugly and smelly. When the algae die and decompose, the oxygen level in the water drops, killing aquatic organisms. Test your soil before fertilizing and choose native plants that require less fertilizer to thrive.

Pesticides, herbicides and insecticides - These chemicals are designed to kill a variety of pests. During storms, rainwater washes these chemicals from plants and the soil and into the storm drains. When pesticides are released into the environment, they can kill or severely harm native plants, animals and insects. Use the least toxic pesticides and herbicides and follow label directions. Learn how to prevent pest problems and weed problems without pesticides and herbicides.

Yard waste - Throwing or blowing yard waste (leaves, tree branches, etc.) into the gutter or street adds to stormwater pollution and can clog storm drains, possibly increasing localized flooding. Compost, mulch leaves and grass clippings back into your lawn or bag yard waste for collection. Sweep driveways and sidewalks instead of hosing them down.

Soil erosion and sediment – Sediment is the loose sand and other soil particles that settle at the bottom of a body of water. Soil and sediment caused by erosion settles in storm drains and clogs them, possibly increasing localized flooding. Sediment that is carried through the storm drain destroys natural habitats in streams, prevents natural vegetation from growing and can kill aquatic organisms. Reduce sediment runoff by seeding bare spots.

Only rain down the drain – Remember that stormwater that enters the drain flows untreated into our local waterways. Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider installing a rain barrel or rain garden to capture stormwater on your property. Treat pool water before draining and do not drain it directly into the street.

PLEASE KEEP GRASS CLIPPINGS OUT OF THE STREET

Residents and landscapers are reminded to keep grass clippings out of the street and the Township's storm drains. Blowing grass and other yard debris into the sidewalk, street, or storm drainage system is a violation of the Township's littering and storm water ordinances.

Grass clippings, leaves, and other lawn debris can clog storm drains, resulting in street and private property flooding. Also, storm drains flow directly to local waterways untreated. Grass clippings add unnecessary nutrients, which help feed harmful algal blooms. In addition to environmental harm, you may be creating a safety hazard. When blown into the street, clippings can create a slippery and dangerous surface for traveling motorcyclists and bicyclists.

Using a mulching mower puts clippings back into the turf and keeps the nutrients where they belong. Should you choose to use a discharging mower, please be sure to point the blower toward your property (away from the street) to prevent clippings from leaving the lawn. When finished mowing, please be sure to use a blower, broom, or rake to clean up any grass clippings or debris that have inadvertently made their way into the street, sidewalk, or storm drain. We appreciate your cooperation.



BRUSH RECYCLING SCHEDULE

Public Works will begin brush collection in April through November. The schedule may be modified at any time due to personnel, equipment and inclement weather.

- Please ensure brush is out **prior to 6:00 am.**
- Every street will be collected only one time. The Public Works Department cannot return to pick up brush placed curbside midweek, and the brush will not be collected if your street has already been done.
- To prevent piles from sitting curbside for long periods of time **and contributing to stormwater pollution** please **do not place brush curbside more than one week prior to pick up.**
- Brush should be no larger than (8) eight inches in diameter, and must be four (4) feet or longer.
- Brush should be piled curbside so as to not block view or traffic, with all cut ends facing the same direction. For ease of loading all cut ends should be facing away from traffic, as brush will be fed into the chipper cut ends first.
- All vines, bamboo, and root balls must be removed. **Mixed materials will not be collected.**
- Public Works will not collect large piles of brush as a result of any large landscaping projects or commercially cut brush. Disposal must be provided by the contractor or removed at the homeowner's expense. This service is provided to assist resident's dispose of small amounts of brush and tree limbs.
- Brush resulting from lot clearing and/or tree removal by a contractor or done by the owner themselves shall be the responsibility of the property owner and shall not be collected by Public Works. Disposal must be provided by the contractor or removed at the homeowner's expense.
- Small sticks, vines, and small shrubs can be disposed of through bulk pickup, as long as they are tied in bundles weighing less than 50 pounds and are no longer than three (3) feet in length.
