

Dominic F. Santillo has been a resident of Eastampton Township since 2013, residing in Eastampton Farms. An active member of the community, Dominic serves as a volunteer coach for Westampton Recreation and Sacred Heart CYO Baseball. A member of the Sons of the American Legion, Mount Holly Post #11, he is also a member of the Board of Directors of Sacred Heart CYO serving as VP Marketing.

Dominic and his wife of thirteen years, Elizabeth, met at The College of New Jersey. They previously lived together in Bordentown and Willingboro before settling down in Eastampton with their three children: Dominic Jr. (11), Kaitlyn (9) and David (6). All three children attend Eastampton Community School and are active participants in Eastampton Youth Soccer Association, Westampton Recreation and Sacred Heart CYO Baseball & Softball.

Dominic is employed by Christiana Care Health System in Newark, DE as an Information Services Team Leader. He has worked at Christiana Care for over 6 years and currently oversees the Enterprise Medical Record Core and Incident Management Services team. He is graduate of The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) and participated in Student Government and other activities while attaining a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with a Specialization in Information Systems Management.

As a high school junior, Dominic was selected to attend the American Legion Jersey Boys State ("ALJBS") program where he was elected "mayor" at the week-long, hands-on leadership seminar on civics and government. After an invitation to return to staff, he has continued to serve as a member of the all-volunteer staff and now serves as First Assistant Director and Dean of the Program. In addition, he also was selected as a Trustee of the New Jersey Boys State Foundation - the fundraising organization associated with the program. In June of 2008, Dominic was elected as Chairman and has since served in that capacity.

Dominic was elected to Township Council in November 2018 and represents the Township Council on the Land Use Planning Board.

Eddie has been a resident of Eastampton since 1989, and began his early education at preschool in Eastampton. He then attended Eastampton Elementary School, and continued on to Eastampton Middle School. He graduated from what is now known as the Community School in 2000.

Eddie then graduated from Rancocas Valley Regional High School in 2004, and was awarded a partial scholarship to DeVry University. Through enrollment in summer courses Eddie accelerated his degree completion and graduated from DeVry in October 2007 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. He was also one of the first students to graduate with a concentration in Business Information Systems.

Eddie became actively involved in the community during his early life through participation in his Eagle Scout project with the beautification of Veterans Memorial Park, earning the highest scouting rank in Scouts BSA. He was also a participant in the Eastampton Youth Soccer Association where he later became an official FIFA Referee for the organization in 2001 and continues to referee soccer. Eddie joined the Eastampton Recreation Committee in 2017 and became Co-Chair in 2018. In 2019 he served on the Veterans & Military Affairs Committee. Eddie was elected as Councilman in 2018, serving his first year on town council in 2019. He is proud to be part of a community that is focused on growth and community efforts to work together for a better future.

Jay has been a resident of Eastampton Township since 1991. For 10 years he lived in Eastampton Mews and served as President on the board of the Eastampton Mews Homeowners Association. In 2001 he and his family moved to the Lakeview section of town. Prior to his election to Eastampton Township Council, he was active on the Township's Environmental Commission and was Vice Chair of the Township's Land Use Planning Board.

Jay and Kim, his wife of 30 years, have two children, Joshua and Jenna, who both attended the Eastampton Community School. Jay has been very active in the community for many years. He coached youth baseball and softball and currently volunteers much of his time in support of the performing arts programs at Rancocas Valley Regional High School. He also serves as a Chief Steward with the Communications Workers of America Local 1036 and is a New Jersey AFL-CIO endorsed labor candidate.

For the past 32 years Jay has been employed as an environmental professional at the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and has a diverse background in several clean water programs working on initiatives such as watershed restoration, sustainability and controlling water pollution. He also represents the State of New Jersey on the federal Delaware Estuary Program, working with partners from around the region in the corporate, public and non-profit sectors.

He attended Rowan University, where he met his wife Kim and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology in 1988. In 2017, he earned a Certified Public Manager (CPM) from the Rutgers University School of Public Affairs and Administration. He has also been an Instructor at Rutgers University teaching Continuing Professional Education courses on Wetlands, Stormwater and Floodplain Management and has been a guest speaker on environmental issues at classes and seminars at the University of Pennsylvania, Yale University, Montclair State University, Stevens Institute of Technology and at several environmental, professional an governmental organization events.

Jay was first elected to Township Council in 2008 and served as Deputy Mayor in 2009 and 2019; and as Mayor in 2010 and 2017. He currently represents Township Council on the Environmental Advisory Committee, and has previously represented the Township Council on the Land Use Planning Board and Economic Development Advisory Committee.

Anthony was one of the founding members of Eastampton's first girls softball team, The Eastampton Knights, which has now evolved into the Central Burlington Knights Softball Organization. He formerly served as the Head Coach of the Lady Patriots Softball Team, which includes many girls that are Eastampton residents, as well as others from the RV sending district.

Anthony has been employed for the past 35 years by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 456. He attended Middlesex County College for 2 years, followed by a 5 year Apprenticeship at MCVTS, graduating with High Honors. Anthony has been the Electrical General Foreman on various large projects throughout New Jersey, including Princeton University Hospital, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, Seton Hall University, Rutgers University, and major data centers. He is currently employed with EleanorHawkeye as Supervisor of Underground Electrical Transmission working with PSE&G and other utility companies updating the electrical infrastructure throughout the state.

Dog Licensing

Residents Are Reminded That All Dogs over 6 Months of Age Are Required to be Licensed Each Year. Dog licenses are valid for the current calendar year and expire annually on December 31. We have now started our 2020 licensing, which may be done by mail or in person. A \$2.00 per month additional fee will be assessed for each dog registered after January 31.

In addition to normal business hours of Monday through Friday, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, the <u>Manor House will be open to license dogs on Saturday, January 18 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm</u>. The cost is \$10.00 for a neutered/spayed dog and \$13.00 for a non-neutered/spayed dog. Animal Control personnel are permitted to inspect current licenses for all dogs residing within the Township. Licensing information may be obtained in person at the Manor House or by calling (609) 267-5723, ext. 200.

Please note that the rabies vaccination must be valid through November 1, 2020 by NJ State Law to obtain the license.

The Burlington County Animal Shelter Free Rabies Clinic will be held <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 21, 2020 from 3:00 PM to 4:00 PM</u> at 35 Academy Drive, Westampton, NJ 08060.

They advise not arriving any earlier then 2:30 pm as the Vet does not start to administer the vaccine until 3:00 pm. Please bring proof of prior rabies vaccine (tag, certificate, township license, vet records) so the animal may receive a three year booster, without proof of prior vaccine the vaccine will be marked for one year. The line will form in the front of the building outside so please dress accordingly to the weather.

<u>Tips for Residents to Follow During Winter Weather Advisories and</u> Storms:

- Be aware of parking regulations and once snow has begun, remove all vehicles from roadways to enable plow trucks to clear the roads. In general, it is helpful to park vehicles in garages and driveways wherever possible and not on the street during a storm to improve street snow clearing.
- Remove accumulated snow from abutting sidewalks to assist neighbor and school student safety. When clearing snow, be mindful not to shovel snow into roadways or adjoining properties.
- Shoveling out neighborhood fire hydrants is encouraged to allow for quick location and access in event of an emergency. Residents should be aware of fire hydrant locations and street address signs that could become inaccessible due to snow accumulation.
- Unless officially authorized, residents should never assume that frozen ponds or lakes are suitable for skating or other recreational activities

Special Meeting Notice

TAKE NOTICE that Eastampton Township shall hold a Special Meeting on Wednesday, January 8th at 5:30 p.m. to be held in the Eastampton Township Municipal Building located at 12 Manor House Court in Eastampton, New Jersey. The purpose of this meeting is to have a question and answer session on the new automated trash collection service starting on February 4, 2020. No Formal action will be taken.

Automated Trash Collection Frequently Asked Questions

Why has Eastampton Township moved to an automated trash truck?

The Township considered many factors before making the final determination. Communities that have chosen to go with an automated service have reported a significant reduction in the amount of trips taken to the landfill. This has the additional benefit of reducing the cost of fuel for the trash truck. The new containers with lids keeps rain and snow from impacting the weight of the loads delivered to the landfill, further reducing tonnage costs. Automation is a faster and more efficient way to collect residential solid waste. It was more cost effective to transition to the automated trash collection system then to continually repair outdated equipment on multiple vehicles. There were many instances where trash collection was delayed due to the maintenance of these outdated pieces of equipment. We wish to minimize any equipment related delays to our residents.

In a time when many communities have to contend with 2% caps on their expenditures and facing a higher cost for trash collection, it was determined an automated trash collection system offered the township the best opportunity to provide the service without negatively impacting other services.

In addition to time and cost savings, the program will help keep our neighborhoods neat and clean, improve safety on residential streets, and provide safer working conditions for trash collectors.

Do I have to pay for my new trash cart?

No. All households will receive one new, 96-gallon trash cart at no charge. There is also a 10-yr. manufacturer's warranty on the trash cart provided.

What do I do if I have a large household and need a second cart?

Each trash cart holds approximately 8-9 average filled 13-gallon bags of trash. This equals an equivalent of 3-4 average household trash cans. We ask that residents take the opportunity to use the trash cart for their weekly household trash collection to see how much trash it can accommodate before purchasing a second cart at the cost of \$60.00. During the initial rollout phase of this program quantities are unavailable for the purchase of a second cart, but we will have a second cart request list for when additional quantities are available.

When and how will we receive our new carts?

Carts will be delivered to every household in the Township on or about the week of January 27, 2020.

What do the new carts look like?

Eastampton's new trash carts are very similar to your blue recycling cart, and these uniform carts will help keep our residential streets neat and clean. The carts will have the Eastampton logo on the sides and lid, and will be linked to your address via a serial number embedded in the plastic.

(<u>Please note Eastampton's carts will be GREEN</u>, not gray as seen in the sample picture below.)



How do I prepare my trash cart for weekly collection?

All trash should be bagged before being placed in the cart. The lid to the cart must close tightly, and no material should be sticking out of the cart. Cart handles and wheels should be facing the house and the lid opening should face the street. Trash carts should be placed at the curb at least 4 feet from obstacles such as mailboxes, telephone poles and any overhead obstructions.

When will automated trash collection begin?

Automated collection will begin the week of February 4, 2020.

Will my collection day remain the same?

Yes. Your trash will continue to be collected weekly on the same collection day.
