

Last Day to Register to Vote for the November 5th General Election is **Tuesday**, October 15.

Vote by Mail Voters may apply for a ballot in-person in the county clerk's office anytime up to 3 p.m. on the day before an election. Ballots issued over-the-counter may be taken directly to the Board of Elections on the first floor at 50 Rancocas Road to be voted and turned in.

Voters also have the option of returning their ballot by mail. Voted ballots must be received by the Board of Elections before polls close on the day of the election when delivered in person. A mailed ballot may be postmarked by Election Day and must be received by the Board of Elections within 48 hours to be counted.



Tax Payments are due November 1st. For your convenience we have a lockbox that you may drop your payment in anytime, located next to the back doors of the Manor House. You may also bring your payment to the window on the 1st floor of the Manor House between the hours of 8:30am-4:30pm M-F. If your tax payment is made after November 10th you will be subject to Tax Sale in December.

Eastampton Township Accepts Online Tax Payments. Residents can make payments online via ACH, e-check, credit card or debit card by visiting https://wipp.edmundsassoc.com/Wipp/?wippid=0311. 

Eastampton Township will transition to an automated trash truck in early 2020. Each household resident will receive one 96-gallon container with wheels and lid (similar to the Recycling Cart). Please Keep Leaves Out of the Street and Drains. Residents and landscapers are reminded to keep leaves out of the street and the Township's storm drains. Blowing leaves and other yard debris into the sidewalk, street, or storm drainage system is a violation of the Township's littering and storm water ordinances.

Grass clippings, leaves, and other lawn debris can clog storm drains, resulting in street and private property flooding. Also, storm drains flow directly to local waterways untreated. In addition to environmental harm, you may be creating a safety hazard. When blown into the street, leaves can create a slippery and dangerous surface for traveling motorcyclists and bicyclists.

Eastampton Township Leaf Collection Information. Leaf collection begins the first week of October and will be collected through January, 2020. Residents can bag leaves separately from household trash, or rake them to the curb for collection. Leaves should be placed in the grass strip between the curb and sidewalk, not in the street. Leaves should not be placed near fire hydrants, sign posts, portable basketball hoops, or telephone poles. Leaves must be free of all trash, sticks, branches, vines, rocks, dirt, and debris. Mixed material will not be collected. Attention Residents Feeding of wild deer is undesirable because:

• Feeding increases reproductive potential.

Deer with higher nutrition levels have larger litter sizes and breed earlier. Does dependent solely upon natural food sources generally breed at 1.5 years of age and give birth to a single fawn. Does with supplemental food breed at 6 months of age and give birth to one fawn; 1.5 year olds generally have twins, and triplets are not uncommon in older does.

• Deer lose their fear of humans.

In NJ, deer are considered a "potentially dangerous species" because of their ability to inflict serious physical harm to humans with their hooves and antlers. Male deer become more aggressive during the breeding season, and females may become defensive of their fawns. The last reported attack of a deer on a person was in 2012 in Lake Hopatcong, NJ. Deer that become problematic are usually euthanized.

• Feeding enhances the spread of disease and parasites, and may compromise the health of non-target species.

Concentrating deer in unnaturally high numbers around food piles increases nose-to-nose contact and may heighten the transmission of pathogens and parasites. Additionally, large piles of supplemental foods like corn often develop toxic fungi, which cause ill effects to both deer and other animals that come to the food pile.

• Deer feeders are bad neighbors.

Deer cannot meet all their nutritional needs from a food pile, and will consume the plantings of surrounding properties or devastate the surrounding natural environment after the supplemental food is consumed. Because feeding concentrates deer in unnaturally high numbers, environmental damage is often severe.

• Feeding can change behavioral patterns.

Feeding may cause deer to cross roadways they normally would not, increasing the potential for deer-vehicle collisions.

• Feeding can sicken and kill deer.

Deer, like most animals, have symbiotic microorganisms in their digestive system which enable them to break down the cellulose found in plant matter. As the seasons slowly change from one to another, so too do these organisms change to accommodate the change in available natural foods. When deer are fed high carbohydrate foods out of season they lack the necessary gut microflora to digest these foods. This can result in a condition known as *lactic acidosis*, which causes bloating, diarrhea, enteritis, and in some cases, death.

Restaurant week

The Burlington County Freeholders understand restaurants play an important role in making Burlington County a highly desirable place in which to live, work and play. In addition to offering a wide variety of dining experiences, restaurants make a healthy contribution to the County's economy. According to the *2016 County Busines*s *Patterns* published by the U.S. Census Bureau, the food service industry employed about 10,400 persons in Burlington County.

To emphasize the importance of these businesses, the Freeholders want to shine a spotlight on the county's restaurants during a new initiative – "Taste of Burlington County" restaurant week – that will run from October 20 to 26, 2019.

To promote "Taste of Burlington County" to over 178,000 households in the county, the Freeholders will put the initiative on its website and social media, issue new releases about the initiative, and advertise it in local newspapers. All participating restaurants will be listed on the County website. The Freeholders will encourage municipalities to promote restaurant week on their websites and social media and in their newsletters.

The Freeholders invite your restaurant to participate in "Taste of Burlington County." The Department of Economic Development and Regional Planning of the Burlington County Bridge Commission will manage this initiative on the Freeholders' behalf. School News



Voters in the five communities that make up the Rancocas Valley Regional High School District approved a \$21.7 million bond referendum on Sept. 24 to fund highpriority, larger scale projects included in the district's Vision 2020 Strategic Plan. Unofficial vote tallies are 2,482 in favor and 951 opposed. Vote By Mail ballots that were postmarked by September 24th will be counted, and final results will be available from the Burlington County Clerk's Office.

"Thank you to the communities of Eastampton, Hainesport, Lumberton, Mount Holly and Westampton for supporting our district and taking their RV PRIDE to the polls," RVRHS Superintendent Chris Heilig, Ed.D. said "We can now finish strong to complete our Vision 2020 Strategic Plan and fulfill our commitment to make a long-term, collective investment in our students and their futures."

The referendum grew out of the district's Vision 2020 Strategic Plan, developed and prioritized with input gathered at community engagement forums beginning in the fall of 2016. The referendum will fund significant capital improvements needed to finalize action steps in this plan, many of which are tied to safety and security. 
