

Deputy Mayor Anthony Zeno

Anthony became a resident of Eastampton when he moved to his home in Carriage Park in 2008 with his wife Michelle and their 4 children, Anthony Jr., Angela, Dominique and Michael. Anthony Jr. is a member of the United States Air National Guard and a graduate of Penn State University with a Masters Degree from George Washington University. He is a detective with the Baltimore Police Department as he resides in Maryland with his wife Ali and their son Vincent. Angela resides in Burlington Township with her husband Isaac and their three children, Gabriella, Anthony and Alaina. Dominique attends Rancocas Valley Regional High School and Michael attends the Eastampton Community School.

Shortly after moving to town Michelle joined the Eastampton Community School PTA, and the Eastampton Township Recreation committee. Anthony became a volunteer on the Eastampton Recreation Committee and was elected to the Eastampton Township Council in 2012. Since his election, he has served as Deputy Mayor (2014, 2016, and 2021), Mayor (2015 and 2019), on the Recreation Committee (2012-2014), on the Land Use Planning Board (2014-2015, and 2019-2020), on the Finance Committee (2015-2016 and 2018-2019), and on the Economic Development Advisory Committee (2016-2020).

Anthony has spent many years volunteering his time with Youth organizations. He was the Treasurer of North Brunswick Youth Baseball, President of North Brunswick Pop Warner, and Vice President of Central Jersey Pop Warner, which governed all Pop Warner Football teams in Central and North Jersey. Anthony has spent the last 30 years around children making sure activities and sports were provided, keeping children off the streets and helping them grow into involved community members. Anthony was one of the founding members of Eastampton's first girls softball team, The Eastampton Knights, which has now evolved into the Central Burlington Knights Softball Organization. He formerly served as the Head Coach of the Lady Patriots Softball Team, which includes many girls that are Eastampton residents, as well as others from the RV sending district.

Anthony has been employed for the past 36 years by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 456. He attended Middlesex County College for 2 years, followed by a 5 year Apprenticeship at MCVTS, graduating with High Honors. Anthony has been the Electrical General Foreman on various large projects throughout New Jersey, including Princeton University Hospital, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, Seton Hall University, Rutgers University, and major data centers. He is currently employed with EleanorHawkeye as Supervisor of Underground Electrical Transmission working with PSE&G and other utility companies updating the electrical infrastructure throughout the state.

Anthony, Michelle, Dominique and Michael love to call Eastampton home. Anthony is dedicated to the Youth in the community and to providing quality programs and services to the residents of Eastampton Township to continue advancing the efforts of various paths of progress.

Council Member Rob Apgar

Rob has been a resident of Eastampton since 2010. He lives with his wife Ally, a public school teacher, and their two children in Eastampton Farms. His daughters attend the Eastampton Community School.

Currently employed by the State of New Jersey, Rob is a grants administrator with experience in the non-profit and public sectors. Rob has also taught courses in sustainable development and environmental history at Rowan College at Burlington County (formerly BCC) and The College of New Jersey.

Rob earned a Bachelor of Arts in history from The College of New Jersey in 2005, graduating with highest honors, and a Master of Environmental Studies degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 2010, with a concentration in environmental policy.

While on Council, Rob has served as a member of the Environmental Advisory Committee, a member of the Land Use Planning Board, Council's liaison to the Eastampton Community School, and as Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

Council Member Eddie Besko

Eddie has been a resident of Eastampton since 1989, and has completed his education here from preschool through the eighth grade. After graduating from Rancocas Valley Regional High School in 2004, Eddie then graduated from DeVry University where he had been awarded a partial scholarship. He completed his Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration and was one of the first to graduate with a concentration in Business Information Systems. Taking courses throughout the summers enabled Eddie to accelerate his graduation date seven months earlier.

Eddie has been and continues to be actively involved in Scouting, attaining the prestigious Eagle Scout rank and for his Eagle Scout project he led the beautification of Veterans Memorial Park. Eddie is currently serving as a troop committee member. He also had been a team member in the Eastampton Youth Soccer Association and later became a soccer referee in 2001 and continues refereeing to this day.

Eddie joined the Eastampton Recreation Committee in 2017 and became Co-Chair in 2018. In 2019, he began serving on the Veterans & Military Affairs Committee. Eddie was elected as Councilman in 2018, serving his first year on town council in 2019. He is proud to be part of a community that is focused on growth and community efforts to work together for a better future.

Council Member Jay Springer

Jay has been a resident of Eastampton Township since 1991. For 10 years he lived in Eastampton Mews and served as President on the board of the Eastampton Mews Homeowners Association. In 2001 he and his family moved to the Lakeview section of town. Prior to his election to Eastampton Township Council, he was active on the Township's Environmental Commission and was Vice Chair of the Township's Land Use Planning Board.

Jay and Kim, his wife of 31 years, have two children, Joshua and Jenna, who both attended the Eastampton Community School. Jay has been very active in the community for many years. He coached youth baseball and softball and currently volunteers much of his time in support of the performing arts programs at Rancocas Valley Regional High School. He also serves as a Chief Steward with the Communications Workers of America Local 1036 and is a New Jersey AFL-CIO endorsed labor candidate.

For the past 32 years Jay has been employed as an environmental professional at the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and has a diverse background in several clean water programs working on initiatives such as watershed restoration, sustainability and controlling water pollution. He also represents the State of New Jersey on the federal Delaware Estuary Program, working with partners from around the region in the corporate, public and non-profit sectors.

He attended Rowan University, where he met his wife Kim and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology in 1988. In 2017, he earned a Certified Public Manager (CPM) from the Rutgers University School of Public Affairs and Administration. He has also been an Instructor at Rutgers University teaching Continuing Professional Education courses on Wetlands, Stormwater and Floodplain Management and has been a guest speaker on environmental issues at classes and seminars at the University of Pennsylvania, Yale University, Montclair State University, Stevens Institute of Technology and at several environmental, professional an governmental organization events.

Jay was first elected to Township Council in 2008 and served as Deputy Mayor in 2009 and 2019; and as Mayor in 2010 and 2017. He currently represent Township Council on the Environmental Advisory Committee and has previously represented the Township Council on the Land Use Planning Board and Economic Development Advisory Committee.

Dog Licensing

Residents Are Reminded That All Dogs over 6 Months of Age Are Required to be Licensed Each Year. Dog licensing began on January 4, 2021. The cost for the month of January is \$10.00 for a neutered/spayed dog and \$13.00 for a non-neutered/spayed dog. A \$2.00 per month additional fee will be assessed for each dog registered after January 31. Please note that the rabies vaccination must be valid through November 1, 2021 by NJ State Law to obtain the dog license. As the Manor House is closed to the public we have several ways to process your 2021 dog license application:

- Online payments are now accepted! To make an online payment click here to be redirected to a secure page. If you would like your dog license mailed to you please mail or drop off a self-addressed stamped envelope to 12 Manor House Court. If you are a new resident, you have a new animal to be licensed, or your rabies vaccination has expired there will be a delay in your licensing.
- You may mail or drop off the dog license application at 12 Manor House Court. If you would like the license mailed back to you please include a self-addressed stamped envelope. If one is not provided it will be available for pickup at the Drop Box at the Manor House.
- If you pay online or drop off the application your license will be ready for pickup within three business days at the Drop Box at the Manor House.

Please ensure your dog's rabies vaccination does not expire before November 1, 2021 or the dog license cannot be issued as per NJ state law.

NJ Residents can Now Pre-register for the Vaccine

Single-Use Paper and Plastic Bags Ban

On November 4th, 2020, Governor Murphy signed S864, the nation's strictest single use plastics and paper ban. Beginning in May 2022, both plastic and paper single-use bags, as well as disposable food containers and cups made from polystyrene foam, will be banned statewide This bill is a significant step to reduce harm and pollution that these products cause to our environment. Tips for Residents to Follow During Winter Weather Advisories and Storms:

- Be aware of parking regulations and once snow has begun, remove all vehicles from roadways to enable plow trucks to clear the roads. In general, it is helpful to park vehicles in garages and driveways wherever possible and not on the street during a storm to improve street snow clearing.
- Remove accumulated snow from abutting sidewalks to assist neighbor and school student safety. When clearing snow, be mindful not to shovel snow into roadways or adjoining properties.
- Shoveling out neighborhood fire hydrants is encouraged to allow for quick location and access in event of an emergency. Residents should be aware of fire hydrant locations and street address signs that could become inaccessible due to snow accumulation.
- Unless officially authorized, residents should never assume that frozen ponds or lakes are suitable for skating or other recreational activities
